
Since **The UCAP School** began, one thing has been a consistent strength: *The network of friends who support it*. Because of help from friends like you, our school

Coming Back for More: UCAP School Grad Returns as Dean of Students

The UCAP School has evolved a lot in almost thirty years. **Abraham Henderson, UCAP Class of '94**, can speak to how much. Abraham has officially joined The UCAP School as **Dean of Students**.



Q. What was The UCAP School (then called The Urban Collaborative) like when you attended?

A. We were in the basement of a shared building in the south side of Providence, with 100 or so kids, from middle and high school. It was a very tough area. But even then we knew that the likelihood of kids dropping out would be very high without UCAP. UCAP gave us a chance – a helping hand.

Q. Do you remember many of the teachers?

A. I could tell you the name of every teacher I had here, versus the one or two I remember from high school. For example, Jim Snead ("Big Jim Snead"); he was my science teacher and wrestling coach. Al Lemos, my social worker. Storytelling/arts educators Rafini and Valarie Tutson helped a lot of kids get into acting and playwriting. They also taught me what it was, historically, to be a man of color. John Howard, my history teacher, started a phenomenal Explorer's group. And of course, Rob DeBlois. He was and is a beacon for the students. Every teacher here helped accelerate my learning and also taught me much more about myself. They taught me about what I call, "love tough."

Q. How would you describe "love tough?"

A. There were three adults who really influenced me - Big Jim, Rob, and Brian Scott, who was my basketball coach. They were very direct with me, very straightforward. They taught me that it's OK to make mistakes. You could fall on your face a million times, but not once would they lose faith in you. Whether you like it or not, they are not gonna quit on you. It's what I call "love tough." It's not just "tough love;" it's more. I made plenty of mistakes and UCAP provided me an opportunity to make something of myself in spite of that. It's a really caring approach – kids make mistakes; throw them back into the water.

Q. What have you been up to since you graduated from UCAP in 1994?

A. I graduated from Mt Pleasant High School and then earned my bachelor's degree in Philosophy of Urban Education from UMASS Amherst. After college I worked for several

organizations serving communities and at-risk kids, including The Children's Crusade and The Peace Corps. Eventually, I served as a juvenile correctional officer and a teacher at the ACI and the RI Training School. There I saw first-hand the effects of poverty and lack of education on crime and recidivism. At the ACI, 70% of first-time offenders have no high school diploma. We saw generational recidivism of poverty-stricken families.

Kids who stay back once are twice as likely to drop out. One of the reasons I came back to **The UCAP School** is because we are helping those at-risk kids by giving them the chance to get back to grade level – and stop the cycle.

Q. How is UCAP different now and how is it the same?

A. Through the years, I have visited and witnessed the positive changes in the atmosphere of the school. A big part of that is a much brighter, nicer facility that the students, teachers and staff have pride in. I'm happy to see that the students have their own gym. Everything feels much more positive and hopeful in this building.

The student population is more concentrated toward middle school now, more diverse, and the class sizes are small. That creates greater opportunity for focus and relationship-building. A lot of staff have been here for a long time. That says a lot about the teachers really caring about the kids and being committed to what UCAP is trying accomplish. There are authentic restorative practices happening here. It's a caring community in which members know the names of every student. Issues will happen at home, on the street, in the community – we have teachers who support kids throughout those challenges. UCAP has their backs.

Q. Would you be the person you are today without UCAP?

A. UCAP changed me tremendously. I came from a difficult environment. At larger schools, it's easy to fall through the cracks. And that's what was happening to me. Teachers at middle schools weren't invested in the kids. Here, I received care, support and opportunity to catch up. I felt a lot of love at UCAP – there's a lot of ugly in the real world.

Besides being excited about this new role, I feel very fortunate to be blessed as a parent. Having a child makes this work even more profound.

Q. What do you hope to accomplish in your new position?

A. I want to support the students in every way possible, drawing from what I learned as a student and from my experience as an adult who has seen the results when a school like UCAP is not involved. I'm excited not only to be a part of **The UCAP School** as Dean of Students, but also to be part of bringing UCAP to the next level and giving kids the opportunities they deserve to attain a better quality of life through hard work, dedication and love for themselves and the greater community around them. I feel thankful and blessed. Thankful every day.

A core component of our personalized learning environment, **Beyond U** programs are totally reliant on the generosity of UCAP's donors and a 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) grant. **Beyond U** provides students with enriched experiences that go well beyond text books and classrooms, and are essential for students to be successful today.

Thanks to our friends and donors, **Beyond U**, had another dynamic year, providing interesting and diverse program options for our students. Once again, we had 100% participation from our 140 students, each program exposing them to higher thinking, personalized learning, healthy social skills, and a connection to higher education and career paths. We offer about 24 different recurring programs each week, including STEM, enrichment, academics, fitness, the arts, and field trips to work places, colleges and cultural sites.



We believe in our students and want them to feel inspired about their future. STEM learning continues to be a major focus within our Beyond U Programs. Our partnerships with **Save the Bay** and the **Community Boating Center** provide a unique learning experience for our students with the opportunity to incorporate STEM learning and real life learning.



The UCAP School has partnered with **Fight 2 Fitness** a boxing fitness gym, owned by Rich and Alyssa Gingras, and located in Pawtucket, RI. Over the past five years, more than 200 of our students have learned valuable fitness techniques and were trained by boxing professionals. They also learn to create healthy eating habits and focus on team building skills. Our kids have loved this unique experience as they learn a new way to be healthy and exercise.

We could not provide students with the highest quality of athletic, enrichment and STEM programs, without strong relationships with our community partners. Thank you partners!
